Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends,

I hope that whatever it is that you have chosen to do or not to do during the season of Lent is still going according to plan. Keeping any form of discipline during lent or indeed at any time of year is not an easy thing to do, as someone who has attempted to pack up smoking on many occasions and failed miserably, I can speak from personal experience. So far this time there have been a few slip ups along the way and the feeling when I succumb to temptation is normally one of frustration and failure.

Failure of any sort can be hard to deal with, it is human nature that we cannot always get things right and failure is sadly a part of life whether we like it or not. Many years ago, I was listening to Thought for the Day on Radio 4 and the speaker that morning was a Sikh gentleman. The one sentence that has stuck with me was the words "Every setback is a set up for a comeback". We will probably all be aware of various tales of individuals trying and trying again in the face of problems. Whilst these can be helpful, there are times when we need to accept that we will not succeed, and we may need to re-think our goals. In the case of small things this is not so bad, but there will be times in our lives when the sense of failure and inability to get things right will weigh heavily on our minds, this can lead us to feeling miserable and distraught. This can then begin to affect our relationships with other people and the world at large.

Whilst I would never say that failure is a good thing, in a Christian context it is worth remembering that failure and making mistakes are not the disasters that they need to be. Whatever we have done or failed to do in our lives, God will forgive us and continue to forgive us time and again. In the Church in Wales there is not the formal act of confession that we see in Roman Catholicism, but the sacrament is there and should anyone wish to make a formal confession and receive God's forgiveness then any Priest will be happy to facilitate this. But we might remember that at the beginning of almost every act of worship or prayer we have a chance to say sorry to God as we make our confession in one form or another. We don't even need to do this in a formal setting. At any time we can ask for God's forgiveness and if we are truly sorry, we will be forgiven, and the slate is wiped clean. This can happen again, again and again because our God is a god of love and forgiveness who loves each and every one of us in a way that we could never imagine. It matters not a bit what it is that we have done or failed to do. This will not affect our relationship with God if we really are truly sorry and want to attempt to change.



Why is the St Mary's lit up in blue?

St. Mary's Church will be lit on World Parkinson's Day which is 11th April 2025. It's focus is to raise awareness and give people information about Parkison's. On this day buildings around the country are being lit up in blue, to highlight what Parkison's is and how people can help and support the people living with Parkinson's.

Parkinson's is a progressive neurological condition. This means that it causes problems in the brain and gets worse over time.

Around 153,000 people live with Parkinson's in the UK. And it's the fastest growing neurological condition in the world.

There are many potential signs and symptoms of Parkinson's and each person can experience them differently. When you meet one with Parkison's you only meet one person with Parkison's, everyone has different symptoms, there are well over 40 symptoms.

Research suggests that Parkinson's tends to develop gradually. It may be many months, even years, before the symptoms become obvious enough for someone to visit their GP.

Everyone reacts differently to getting a diagnosis. Some people want to join a support group, learn tai chi, abseil down a building. Some people really don't! There's currently no cure for Parkinson's. But Parkison's UK, as are other similar Parkinsons's charities, determined to change that by funding the right research into the most promising treatments.

Living with Parkinson's is tougher than people think. But it doesn't define you. You are still you. You can still do amazing things in spite of Parkinson's. So, please, wear blue on 11th April to support people with Parkinson's. Thank you.


Almost half of all children have been scammed online

Has your child been scammed online? If so, they are not alone! A recent poll for the UK Safer Internet Centre (UKSIC) has found that a staggering 46 per cent of children have been taken in by an online scam. And a study by Vodafone has found that nearly one million 11-to-16-year-olds in the UK have been scammed within the last 12 months.

A third of young people are now worried that new technology, such as AI, will make scams even harder for them to identify.

Most scams seem to take place on social media platforms, where they involve ads or quizzes which appear to be from well-known brands. The children are lured into giving out personal information or buying fake products. Other scams include fake giveaways, phishing and fake websites, fake ticket sales and 'trust trades' in gaming.

Anyone scammed online should report it to Action Fraud or call 0300 1232040 (England, Wales and Northern Ireland). In Scotland, report to Police Scotland.



As it is Lent, I have chosen the most delicious and completely indulgent recipe, to cheer us up in this time of deprivation!

It comes from The Times cookbook of 1972, much beloved by mother, whose copy I still have. It is now very dilapidated, with the front

cover missing, but the page on which the recipe appears is the most spattered from frequent use in the whole book!

Lemon Syllabub, serves 6 ¹/₂ pt of double cream 4oz caster sugar rind and juice of one large lemon 4 tablespoons medium dry sherry

sponge finger biscuits to accompany

Time taken: 10 minutes Prepare in advance

Measure cream, sugar, finely grated lemon rind, strained lemon juice and sherry into a mixing basin. Whisk together until quite thick - this may take 2-3 minutes. Spoon into six serving glasses and chill for several hours.



Church Massacre in DRC

There's been a mass killing in a Protestant church in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) More than 70 bodies were recently reported to have been found. Many were tied up, others beheaded. Women, children and the elderly were among the dead.

One aid expert in DRC doubts the attack was specifically Christian persecution. Instead, it could have been that these people were too weak to travel with the marauding Allied Democratic Forces (ADF) who would have wanted reinforcements or forced war labour.

Vatican News has described this rebel group as being "notorious for its violent tactics." The massacre came, it reported, at a critical moment for eastern DRC.

It was described in a newspaper report at the time as being "cheering evidence of the courage and vitality of the Church in Wales".

Where did your Easter Egg come from?

The paintings of JMW Turner



It was 250 years ago, on 23rd April 1775, that groundbreaking British artist J M W Turner was born. The Londonborn

watercolourist and printmaker transformed the established methods of painting, sweeping aside classical preoccupations of form and order.

Joseph Mallord William Turner, known in his time as William Turner, was a child prodigy born to a modest lower-middle-class family. He enrolled at the Royal Academy of Arts when he was 14 and exhibited his first work there a year later. He was a controversial figure, prone to depression and eccentric ideas, such as having himself tied to the mast of a ship during a storm so that he could experience what he wanted to paint.

Nevertheless Turner, who never married but had two daughters by the widow Sarah Danby, had many admirers and supporters from the outset. He travelled widely, particularly around Europe in 1802, and worked in the open air on detailed pencil sketches which he then turned into paintings.

One of his supporters was the MP and artist Walter Fawkes of Farnley Hall, near Otley in Yorkshire, and Turner returned to the area frequently to paint. He was also a friend of the Norwich School artist and clergyman Thomas Daniell. Turner was certainly not a conventional Christian, but he had attended a Methodist Sunday school as a child and had a deep belief in God as Creator, which he reflected in his use of light in landscapes. Many of his paintings had Biblical themes.

Considered one of the most influential artists of all time, Turner is pictured on the ± 20 banknote, and this year sees a twelve-month festival of events and exhibitions across the UK to mark the 250 years since his birth.



The Real Easter

In CS Lewis's *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe*, the lion Aslan is put to death by the White Witch. The stone table on which He is killed cracks in two, but Aslan meets with Lucy and Susan alive again. He explains the Witch's failure:

'her knowledge goes back only to the dawn of time. But if she could have looked a little further back, she would have known that when a willing victim who had committed no treachery was killed in a traitor's stead, the Table would crack, and Death itself would start working backwards.'

This is a great picture of what Jesus' cross and His resurrection has achieved. As Paul writes, '*I want to know Christ, to know the power of His resurrection*' (Philippians 3:10). To understand the real Easter, we should experience the same power that raised Jesus from the dead!

New Hope: Like the girls in the story, Easter highlights the sadness and confusion that loss brings. Yet the resurrection of Jesus brings new hope, as it demonstrates the victory secured by the cross over sin, Satan and death. We can face life's difficulties knowing that Jesus walks beside us.

New Love: Our relationships are often characterised by a lack of forgiveness, hurt and betrayal. Yet Jesus' resurrection opens the possibility of new love, as His power enables us to accept others and forgive them.

New Life: When we are trying to make sense of life, like the girls in the story, Jesus offers us a living relationship with Himself. It's a friendship with God through Jesus that can begin today and continue for eternity.

When Lucy met Aslan again, she cried: '*Oh, you're real, you're real!*' We too can find the real Easter through a life changing encounter with the living Christ.

Easter Thoughts in a Churchyard

It's a yearly paradox. You've brought some flowers to the churchyard to lay on the grave of a loved one. All around you are graves and headstones, reminders of the inevitable end of life's earthly journey. But it's Easter Day, and from within the church you can hear the singing: 'Jesus Christ is risen today, Alleluia!' Perhaps then you notice a few other things. You're standing among the fresh daffodils and the grass that's suddenly green and growing again. For a moment you pause and reflect on the reverse of an old saying. In the midst of death – we are in life!

That essentially is what Easter is about – an annual reminder that death is not the end of the story. Cookham, in Berkshire, was once the home of the great 20^{th} century painter, Stanley Spencer. Perhaps his most famous painting is 'Resurrection in Cookham Churchyard', which depicts local residents – many of them recognisable village characters – rising up out of their graves to be greeted by the risen Jesus, standing in the church porch. It's a glorious, vivid, shocking reminder of a great assertion. The graveyard is not a terminus, but a junction.

The resurrection of Jesus (and hence our resurrections, too) is the defining claim of Christianity. Christians don't follow the teaching of a prophet who died many centuries ago, or of a holy man whose life is an example to follow, excellent as that may be. They put their trust in a Saviour whom they believe is alive and with them now, and they also believe that through Him they too will move through the junction of death to the journey that lies beyond – a journey he talked about to His followers.

The annual paradox lies in the inescapable fact of death, indelibly represented by those graves and headstones, and in the equally inescapable fact that – in apparent defiance of all logic – human beings down the ages have clung to the belief that death is not the end.

Every culture has its story of the life beyond – the Elysian fields, Valhalla, Nirvana, Abraham's bosom. But only with the coming of Jesus, and the witnessed events of that first Easter morning, has our instinctive belief been given wings. The paradox is the heart of everything. Death is a fact, but life is greater than death. 'Because I live', said Jesus, 'you will also live'.

Second most dangerous place in the World for Christians

After North Korea, where in the world is it most dangerous to be a Christian?

The World Watch List puts Somalia in second place. In the entire country there are only hundreds of Christians, almost all from a Muslim background.

As under President Hassan Sheikh Mohamud, being Muslim is a huge part of Somali identity, to reject Islam is seen as a huge betrayal. Somali converts to Christianity are often killed on the spot when their faith is discovered – murdered either by Islamic militants or even their own family.

Believers who aren't killed outright face vicious persecution from family members, house arrest, forced marriage, sexual violence or being forced to take part in Islamic rituals.

Al-Shabaab, a violent Islamic militant group at war with the government, controls large swathes of the country. This group enforces a strict form of Sharia (Islamic law) and is especially keen to eradicate Christianity from Somalia. Church leaders are particularly targeted.

How can you help Somali Christians? Please keep praying, as your prayers make an enormous difference to those following Jesus, no matter the cost.
