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
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Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends,

In ministry there is normally a little lull after the rather busy times of Holy Week and Easter before the events of the summer start up. This year with Easter being late this lull was shorter than normal and there will be plenty going on. Behind the scenes it has also been rather busy; as most of you are aware the way the Church in Wales is organised has changed a little bit. Rather than being individual parishes we are now grouped into Local Ministry Areas. Day to day this has not changed things very much, but in the background an awful lot has gone on and is still going on.

The often-asked question is "Why?", "Why do we need to do this, why can't we carry on as before?". I am not one that likes change and I am not alone in this. But there are times when circumstances outside of our control dictate what we are to do. One of the main issues behind the move to the ministry area system is that there are less clergy to go around, there are not as many people coming forward for ordination or even lay ministry roles as there was. Money and rising costs is another factor that cannot be ignored. However, the other big issue is that society and the way that everything is run is changing beyond all recognition. The way charities are run has changed, the way safeguarding is implemented and the need for training, GDPR legislation, health and safety have all changed and like it or not we have to comply with all the legislation. This is not a plea for sympathy from the Vicar, but it does explain why at times I may not be as visible as I would like as pencil squeezing and training seem to take up more and more time.

It is a stressful time for some in the church; more and more responsibility is landing on people's shoulders and there is more and more that needs to be remembered. But it is important to remember that the church has faced changes and challenges many times before, although nothing quite as bureaucratic as this has landed before.

The good news is that our three churches are still more than holding their own, we are serving our communities well and with love and care. This is not to say that things could not improve, they always can, but in the main we are doing well. One piece of very good news is that Deirdre Horsler has been accepted for ordination training, the next step on her path to the priesthood. Sarah-Beth another of our worship leaders is looking at becoming a lay reader. Please keep them both in your prayers, we are very blessed with lay ministry in our patch. Brenda Evans, Deirdre & Sarah-Beth all play important roles in the ministry of our churches and long may it continue.

Perhaps you might want to read the lesson in a service, serve on the church council (four or so meetings a year – normally followed by a trip to the pub with the vicar paying)? We could really do with a treasurer for St. Mary's at this time and even this need not be particularly burdensome. The 'someone' to do the job could well be you and this would be a huge help and support.

It is a delight to be your vicar, and it is wonderful that so many things are happening in our churches and in this time of change and transition, we might like to look at how we can change, step up and embrace a new challenge.

God is with us; God will always be with us and the Holy Spirit is moving in our little patch of the vineyard. What is the spirit saying to you?

Mystery Trip


Looking ahead to Saturday 19th July, Fr. Jim will be organising another Mystery Trip.


Same-sex blessings: where next?

The Church in Wales is preparing to revisit its stance on same-sex blessings as the time-limited provision introduced in October 2021 nears its expiration in September 2026. In a message to members, the Archbishop of Wales Andrew John has called for a period of prayerful discernment and open dialogue as the Church explores potential paths forward.

Options include allowing the provision to lapse, extending the current blessings, or taking the significant step of introducing a formal service of marriage for same-sex couples.

Thanks to those who have knitted the twiddle muffs which have gone to Glan Morfa Residential Home and to Plas y Dderwen, Carmarthen, where our former branch leader, Pippa Holloway now resides. Some have also gone to Glangwili Hospital.

Hospital Chaplain, Revd Euryl Howells writes: I have attached a photo of the hearts and crosses I use: Perhaps this explanation is helpful



The holding cross is made of material is padded and is larger than the wooden holding crosses. This is preferable in that if a patient has dementia they often will place the wooden one in their mouth and there is a potential risk in swallowing It is something like 5 inches by 3 and a half inches and as the cross is soft and if they lie on it, it won't make an indent into the skin or even break the skin. Some elderly people are vulnerable and breaking skin on steroids is easy

With the knitted hearts, we will often issue them in loved and lost baby

instances along with the Cross in the pocket or when we minister at death. The idea is that one heart is left with the deceased and the family keep the other

Purple Hearts pattern

You will need: A small amount of double knit yarn.


3.25mm (size 10) knitting needles

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Abbreviations K Knit; P Purl;K2tog Knit 2 stitches together;K2tog tbl Knit 2 stitches together through the back of the loop: Kfb Knit into the front and back of the stitch;M1 Make an stitch by knitting into the bar between 2 stitches P3 tog Purl 3 stitches together; Sts stitches Method: Make 2 Cast on 2 sts. Row 1 Knit Row 2 Purl Row 3 (Kfb) twice. [4 sts] Row 4 Purl Row 5 K1, M1, knit to last st, M1, K1. [2 sts inc'd] Row 6 Purl Rep last 2 rows 8 more times. [22 sts] Row 23 Knit Row 24 Purl Row 25 K1, M1, knit to last st, M1, K1. [24 sts] Row 26 Purl Row 27 Knit Row 28 Purl Row 29 Knit Row 30 P12, turn and work on these sts only Row 31 K1, K2tog tbl, K9. [11 sts] Row 32 Purl Row 33 K1, K2tog, knit to last 3 sts, K2tog tbl. K1 Rep last 2 rows twice more [5 sts] Row 38 P1, p3tog, P1. [3 sts] Cast off. With wrong side facing, rejoin yarn and purl remaining 12sts. Row 1 K9, k2tog, K1. [11 sts] Row 2 Purl Row 3 K1, K2tog tbl, knit to last 3 sts, k2tog Rep last 2 rows twice more [5 sts] Row 8 P1, p3tog,P1 Cast off. To make up, sew the two hearts together leaving a 2cm (1 inch) gap. Stuff gently and sew closed.

Please feel free to make some of these for us. I will get the pattern for the soft cross in due course.





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
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In the first of a series of articles, Kenneth Harrod, Head of Theology and Media at Release International, the voice of persecuted Christians, reminds us of the realities of persecution today.

We've all read the biblical story of Stephen, the first martyr in the New Testament. We've probably heard that Christians in the early centuries suffered all manner of atrocities at the hands of Roman emperors. We know Protestant Reformers were martyred in the 16th Century.

But what about today?

We live in a country where Christianity has been an accepted 'part of the furniture' for centuries. Church buildings are obvious and visible landmarks in our towns and villages; Christian festivals are part and parcel of the calendar year—even for people who profess no Christian allegiance. In many ways, we enjoy the fruit of God having blessed gospel ministry in this land in times past.

But in many parts of our world, life can be very different for Christians particularly for those who seek to obey the Great Commission of Jesus Christ by proclaiming Him.

In some countries, opposition to the Christian faith might come from extremists of another religion; in other countries it might be the authorities themselves. Christians can suffer on-going oppression and violence. Christians may be forced to flee. Christians can find themselves languishing in prison for no other reason than the fact that they *are* Christians. In some places in our world today Christians may pay the ultimate price—martyrdom.

What is our response to all of this?

One of the New Testament images used to describe the Church is that of the 'Body of Christ'. In his first letter to the Corinthians the Apostle Paul wrote of that body: 'If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honoured, all rejoice together.' (1 Cor. 12:26; ESV)

Out of sight should not be out of mind. Spiritual brothers and sisters suffering because they love and worship the same Saviour that we do should be of concern to us.

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Your Favourite Recipe



Kath Nicholas shares the recipe this month: Betty's Macaroons (old imperial measurements)

My mother, Betty Gravell, would make these for an event or a cake stall. She used to get annoyed if the macaroons were sold too cheaply.

Line a bun tin (12 cups) with pastry. Put a very small amount of jam in the base of each. Beat 2 egg whites until stiff. Add 4oz. ground almonds, 4oz. caster sugar, 2 teaspoons cornflour and a few drops of almond essence. Mix and spoon into bun tin. Makes 12. Bake 170°C for about 25 minutes. Can decorate top with some flaked almonds.

Make the pastry you usually make, or you can try this dessert pastry.

Mix 10oz. plain flour, 2 oz. ground almonds, 3oz. icing sugar and ¹/₄ teaspoon salt. In another bowl have 8oz. soft unsalted butter, (can soften in microwave on low setting but do not let it turn to oil), add 2 egg yolks (you will have these from the macaroons as you used only the whites) and one tablespoon brandy. Gradually add the dry ingredients, bring together, wrap in cling and chill. It is not always easy to roll. This quantity will make more than you need so you cold make double the macaroon mix and make 24. If you don't want 24 freeze the left-over pastry as it freezes well or make jam tarts or a pie.

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


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Town News



Mini is named as best-ever British car

What is your favourite British car? Think of the Land Rover, Aston Martin, McLaren, Bentley and Rolls Royce. Then think of the Mini.

That is what a group of judges for the Auto Express did recently, and they chose the Mini.

Their verdict? "Put simply, we reckon no other British- built vehicle better represents the relevant, innovative and pioneering UK automotive industry quite like the world's original small car."

Phil McNamara, editor at large, Auto Express, adds: "there was only ever going to be one winner of our Top 50 Brit cars rundown. The Mini was crowned undisputed champion."

It was in the late 1950s that the British Motor Corporation (BMC) asked car designer Alec Issigonis to come up with a sub-three-metre compact car that could accommodate a family of four. The result was the Mini, soon beloved of the public, celebrities and even (in a modified version) racing drivers.

The modern version of a Mini Cooper is nearly 90cm longer than the original, and prices starts at about £25,000.



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What about Facebook after you die?

The righteous perish, and no one takes it to heart; the devout are taken away, and no one understands that the righteous are taken away to be spared from evil. Those who walk uprightly enter into peace; they find rest as they lie in death' (Isaiah 57:1-2 NIV)

What happens to our Facebook page when we die is probably the last thing on most of our minds. However, many people have an 'online presence' such as Facebook pages, Linked-in, email accounts, Instagram and all sorts of bank accounts and website pages. Who can get access to that information?

Depending on the type of account, a relative or friend might want to close it, retrieve information or images or preserve it in some way. Making a Will is an opportunity to make a clear decision about what happens to things you own, and this includes something electronic and who carries out your wishes.

According to Facebook, you can choose to either appoint a legacy contact to look after your account, or have your account permanently deleted from Facebook. If you do not choose to have your account permanently deleted, it will be memorialised if Facebook are told about the death. Memorialised accounts are a place for friends and family to gather and share memories after a person has passed away.

Google encourages people to think about these issues and they have something called an <u>Inactive Account Manager</u> to let them know who should have access to your information, and whether you want your account to be deleted.

They recognise that many people pass away without leaving clear instructions about how to manage their online accounts. They work with immediate family members and representatives to close the account of a deceased person where appropriate. In certain circumstances they may provide content from a deceased user's account.

The best advice is to think carefully and make choices about what happens in the event of your passing and carefully select someone you trust to do this. As ever this is a light-hearted introduction and if in any doubt get proper advice. Different companies have different policies and procedures so always check carefully.





Open Farm Sunday June 17th



Do you have any farms near to where you live? Then this month, they might just provide you with an interesting day out!

For June brings Open Farm Sunday, which can be a "fabulous opportunity for the public to discover the crucial work farmers do in producing food, nurturing nature, and protecting the environment for future generations."

So says the website, <u>www.farmsunday.org</u>. And on the day, nearly 200 farms throughout the country will be welcoming the public to come and see their farms.

From Inverness to Cornwall, about 170 farms will be putting on guided tours, self-guided walking routes and static displays as part of the event. Visitors will be able to take part in a national pollinators survey. This will involve standing near a crop area for five minutes to count pollinating insects before doing a comparative count in a different habitat.

The day is organised by the group Linking Environment And Farming (LEAF).

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Remembering St. Barnabas 11th June – A likeable disciple

This month we remember St Barnabas, whose real name was Joseph, a wealthy Levite from Cyprus. However, he was better known by his nickname which means 'Son of Encouragement' (Acts 4:36). Throughout Acts we see him encouraging others in different ways.

Barnabas was an example of *generous giving* (Acts 4:36-7), when he sold property and offered the money to the church for those in need. In the midst of an already caring and sharing community, he was singled out as a symbol of generosity. Are we known as somebody who is generous to those in need around us?

Barnabas later *encouraged a new Christian* in the person of Paul (Acts 9:27). After Paul's conversion and knowing his reputation, Barnabas came alongside him and brought him into the fellowship of the church. Are we ready to help those who are new in the faith to find a place in our church?

Finally, Barnabas was sent to the church in Antioch where he 'saw the evidence of the grace of God' (Acts 11:23). It was a church which brought Jewish and Gentile believers together for the first time. Like Barnabas, do we rejoice when we see God doing new things in people's lives? Are we also willing to embrace these things and facilitate change?

Encouragement is one of the spiritual gifts in the New Testament (Romans 12:8). It can be greatly undervalued but still is crucial in growing the church. Like Barnabas, will we nurture gifting; strengthen the doubters and those tempted to give up; show generosity to God's people and beyond the church; alongside strengthening people to move beyond their own comfort zones to help those in need?

Let's be prepared to ask the following questions: '*Are there people alongside us who will encourage us*?' and '*How can we be encouragers to others*?'

The Nicene Creed – Who is God?

Canon Paul Hardingham considers a bedrock of our Christian belief: that God is Trinity.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.'

2025 sees the 1700th anniversary of the Nicene Creed. We use it at Communion services, but how much notice do we take of the words? In this new series we are looking at what it means to believe in God as Trinity.

We believe: In Greek, the Creed begins '*we believe*' (in Latin, '*I believe*.'). It was formulated at the time of Arius, who declared that Jesus was the first and greatest of God's creatures, but not the same as God the Father. His teaching proved so damaging that the Emperor Constantine called an ecumenical council in Nicaea (AD 325) to clarify the core beliefs for all Christians.

in one God: We believe in a God who is both one and Trinity: '*Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one*' (Deuteronomy 6:4). He is the Old Testament God, who we know through the life and work of Jesus and the Holy Spirit. We are to worship Him alone and not people or things.

the Father, the Almighty: God is both the almighty Creator and loving Father: '*Our Father in heaven, hallowed be Your name*' (Matt 6:9). Although the Father of all that exists, He is specifically Father to those who His children through their faith in Jesus.

maker of heaven and earth: God comes before anything that was created, and Creation is His alone: 'In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was formless and empty' (Genesis 1:1,2). The implication is that He created 'ex nihilo' ie out of nothing. He is one God who is unchangeable, lacking in nothing and the source of all that exists.

of all that is, seen and unseen: God did not just create the physical universe, but also the spiritual powers: 'For in Him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things have been created through Him and for Him.' (Colossians 1:16). Reality is more than what we can see, smell, taste, touch or measure.

The Creed establishes the 'big picture' of who God is and challenges our commitment to Him. *How do these opening words of the Nicene Creed speak to us today?*

May monthly gardening checklists

Flowers

- Prune spring shrubs, such as forsythia and chaenomeles, after flowering to keep them compact
- Plant out dahlia tubers and cannas after all risk of frost has passed
- Tie in the new shoots of climbing plants, including clematis, wisteria and honeysuckle, to their supports
- Continue sowing annuals, such as California poppies, into gaps in borders for colour from August into autumn
- Plant up hanging baskets, but keep in a greenhouse or porch for a few weeks to establish, before putting outside
- Apply liquid feed to tulips, daffodils and other spring bulbs to encourage a good display next year
- Plant out summer bedding and tender annuals, including sunflowers, cosmos and nasturtiums, after the last frost
- Remove faded spring bedding, such as wallflowers and forget-me-nots, and add to your compost bin
- Check lilies and fritillaries for scarlet lily beetles and their larvae, as they can rapidly strip plants of all foliage
- Harden off tender plants raised indoors, but bring them back in at night to protect from late frosts
- Pinch out the shoot tips of bedding plants and young annuals, such as fuchsias, to encourage bushier growth
- Add interest to shady borders by planting a selection of hostas and ferns

Fruit and veg

- Earth up potatoes, covering the shoots with soil as they appear
- Sow sweetcorn in deep pots, so the young plants are ready to transplant into the garden in June
- Reduce snail populations by going on regular evening hunts, especially during damp weather
- Start sowing dwarf and climbing French beans, as well as runner beans, directly outdoors in warm weather
- Pick rhubarb stems as they develop, and water plants with liquid feed
- Start hardening off tender young plants, such as tomatoes and courgettes, ready for planting out in mild areas
- Sow batches of salad leaves and stir-fry crops every few weeks to provide continuous pickings
- Hang pheromone traps in apple and plum trees from May to July, to control pests
- Thin out seedlings, like carrots, from earlier sowings to ensure you get healthy, strong-growing plants
- Open fruit cage doors or lift some of the netting to ensure pollinating insects can get access to the flowers
- Remove all strawberry runners, so plants put their full energy into fruiting
- Keep plenty of fleece handy to protect young seedlings or fruit blossom, if late frosts are forecast
