

Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends,

As I look out of the window as I write this, the sun is shining, and the sky is somewhat bluer than in has been for a few days. Summer is hopefully here with all that this entails, for those with green fingers, gardens are flourishing. For those who (like me) would like to have green fingers, we can admire our fantastic display of weeds and look with envy on the work of others. Summer should be a time of enjoyment, holidays, trips out, BBQ's and relaxing in the warmth of the sunshine. None of us is so naïve to think that everything is always rosy, but it often seems easier to be more cheerful when the sun is warming our backs and a light breeze cooling our faces.

When we look at what is happening in the world it can be hard to be cheerful at times. Tensions in the middle east, eastern Europe and in other parts of the world cause concern for many. At home we are all facing pressures that cause stress and worry. We may wonder what can we do about it all. It all boils down a couple of things. As Christians we are called to do whatever is in our power to do to serve those around us and alleviate the sufferings of others. Many of us do this in many various ways, but there are some things that we can all do. There is something that takes little physical effort, no financial outlay and can be done time and time again and that is pray for others and bring them the hope that comes with the Gospel. 




Lou Lou's Repair Cafe Kidwelly, named after our late founder Louise, meets once a month in The Parish Room.



Material Holding Cross 5"x 3½ " Instructions

Cut the cross outlines out and use one as a template to cut 2 crosses out of felt.

Sew the felt crosses together back to back, either with small blanket stiches or small stitches about 3-4 mm from the edge, leaving a gap to insert filling.

9th August - Mary Sumner Day

The Mothers' Union is now more than 140 years old. It has accomplished a staggering amount in that time, and nowadays numbers more than four million members, doing good work in 83 countries. That is a far cry from the modest circle of prayer for mothers who cared about family life, which is how it all began with a rector's wife, Mary Sumner.

Mary was born in late 1828 in Swinton, near Manchester. When she was four, her family moved to Herefordshire. Mary's father, Thomas Heywood, was a banker and historian. Her mother has been described as a woman of "faith, charm and sympathy" – qualities which Mary certainly

01269 861260 07944 991559 inherited. Mrs Heywood also held informal 'mothers' meetings' at her home, to encourage local women. Those meetings may well have inspired Mary's later work.

Mary was educated at home, spoke three foreign languages, and sang well. While in her late teens, on a visit to Rome she met George Sumner, a son of the Bishop of Winchester. It was a well-connected family: George's uncle became Archbishop of Canterbury, and his second cousin was William Wilberforce. Mary and George married in July 1848, soon after his ordination. They moved to Old Alresford in 1851 and had three children: Margaret, Louise and George. Mary dedicated herself to raising her children and supporting her husband's ministry by providing music and Bible classes.

When in 1876 Mary's eldest daughter Margaret, gave birth, Mary was reminded how difficult she had found the burden of motherhood. Soon she decided to hold a meeting to which she invited the local women not only of her own class, but also all the village mothers. Her aim was to find out if women could be brought together to offer each other prayer and mutual support in their roles as wives and mothers. That meeting at Old Alresford Rectory was the inaugural meeting of the Mothers' Union.

For 11 years, the Mothers' Union was limited to Old Alresford. Then in 1885 the Bishop of Newcastle invited Mary to address the women churchgoers of the Portsmouth Church Congress, some 20 miles away. Mary gave a passionate speech about the poor state of national morality, and the vital need for women to use their vocation as mothers to change the nation for the better. A number of the women present went back to their parishes to found mothers' meetings on Sumner's pattern. Soon, the Mothers' Union spread to the dioceses of Ely, Exeter, Hereford, Lichfield and Newcastle. By 1892, there were already 60,000 members in 28 dioceses, and by 1900 there were 169,000 members. By the time Mary died in 1921, she had seen MU cross the seas and become an international organisation of prayer and good purpose.

We will be celebrating Mary Sumner day by going to St. David's Cathedral for a service of thanksgiving. Bus will depart Kidwelly at around 9.30am and return after the service which begins at 4.00pm. Your Favourite Recipe

The Hertfordshire Clanger. Culinary delights from Fr. Jim

My home county of Hertfordshire has never really graced the culinary map of the world. As far as I know there are very few foods named for the county and it is unheard of for any gastrotourist to descend on the area with a gleam in his eye, salivating furiously at the thought of lunch.

There was the local apple – the Hertfordshire Pippin, now probably extinct, a local cheese known by the natives as "artfordshire 'ard" and to my knowledge this has not been produced for at least 80 years and probably wasn't a specific recipe. There is no Hertfordshire equivalent of Bath Buns, Welsh Cakes, Lincolnshire Sausage, Yorkshire Pudding or Lancashire Hotpot. There are a few 'local' recipes which are or were popular and probably derived from the easy availability of various ingredients, but variations on their theme appear across many parts of the British Isles.

What there is though is the wonderful Hertfordshire Clanger. Some of you may have heard of the interloper that is the Bedfordshire Clanger, which is a similar dish and was undoubtably stolen by the untrustworthy, rogues that live across the county boundary and had a habit of invading the county and thieving anything they could get their grubby little hands on. The Clanger was a dish that the men would take out into the fields for their lunches, but I doubt that every agricultural worker went off to plough with a Clanger in their bundle every day. Accounts of the 19th century do mention Clangers alongside the ever popular Thummit or Thumb-bit which was bread, cheese and often a raw onion. So called because of the way that you held it as you ate it.

The word clanger is supposed to come from the word clung, or clagger: dialect terms for heavy, solid or thick.

Like many dishes there is no set recipe and the Clanger was made with whatever was available or cheap at the time. Some recipes are for "alf an 'alf", this being savoury and sweet but some were all savoury. The 'alf and 'alf was supposed to have come from the Village of Trowley, where they were known as a Trowley Dumpling. As well as the stolen Bedfordshire version, there is a savoury dish, made with bacon and onion and known as the Buckinghamshire Bacon Badger (yes, really). But none

Men who toiled with gusto and might among the rolling hills, shady woodlands, glistening streams of God's own country.

This recipe is for an 'alf & 'alf and apart from the pastry and the total quantities of the fillings bung in what you fancy within reason. You could double the savoury filling and make four little ones rather than two big ones.

Pastry and Savoury Filling

325g Self-raising flour 1tsp Salt 100g Shredded suet

50g Butter, chilled and chopped 1 Egg, beaten

Milk to seal and glaze or use another beaten egg.

1 Small onion, chopped Oil or fat to fry the onions and meat with

225g Chopped bacon or minced pork or sausage meat.

1tsp Dried sage (not if you are using a sausage meat with a lot of sage in

it) 1tbsp Worcestershire sauce 1 Cooking apple

50g Frozen peas Salt and pepper to taste

Sweet Filling – or use a few dollops of Jam instead.

2 Cooking apples 100g dried fruit (Sultana, raisins, dates, figs etc.) 2tsp Granulated sugar.

Method.

Step 1 Preheat the oven to 220°C/425°F/Gas 7. To make the savoury filling, fry the onion in the fat in a pan over a medium heat until the onion is soft and golden. Stir in the meat and sage and cook gently for 5 mins, stirring often. Peel, core and chop the apple and add it to the pork mix along with the Worcestershire sauce. Cook for a further 5 mins, then stir in the peas, season to taste and leave to cool.

Step 2 To make the sweet filling, peel and chop the apples into small chunks, place in a mixing bowl stir in the dried fruit and sugar.

Step 3 To make the pastry, mix the flour, salt, suet and chopped butter into a course breadcrumb like consistency. Mix in about 125ml of cold water and the beaten egg to form a smooth dough and knead for a minute. Roll the pastry on a floured surface to about ½cm thick and cut into two rectangles about 15cm (6in) long by 8cm (3in) wide, then brush the edge of the long end with milk or beaten egg.

Step 4 On one side of each pastry rectangle, put half of the savoury filling, and on the other put half of the sweet filling. Roll the pastry over the filling to form a sausage roll shape, and press the centre lightly so that the dividing strip sticks to the top. Push the edges together, brush with milk





or beaten egg. Bake in the preheated oven for 15 mins, then lower the heat to 190°C/375°F/Gas 5 and bake for a further 25 mins.

Serve hot or cold – ideally washed down with a pint of McMullens Beer.

Congratulations, you have now made a genuine Hertfordshire Clanger. Accept no substitutes for this is the real thing.

One final word of advice, if you are ever offered a Clanger of unknown pedigree you can always tell a real Hertfordshire one. Look at the delight in front of you and if the meat is on the right as you gaze upon its beauty then it's the real one. If it's on the left then it's a Bedfordshire interloper and should be avoided at all cost.

6th August – The Transfiguration, a glimpse of glory

The story is told in Matthew (17:1-9), Mark (9:1-9) and Luke (9:28-36). It was a time when Jesus' ministry was popular, when people were seeking Him out. But on this day, He made time to take Peter, James and John, His closest disciples, up a high mountain. In the fourth century, Cyrillic of Jerusalem identified it as Mount Tabor (and there is a great church up there today), but others believe it more likely to have been one of the three spurs of Mount Hermon, which rises to about 9,000 feet, and overlooks Caesarea Philippi.

High up on the mountain, Jesus was suddenly transfigured before His friends. His face began to shine as the sun; His garments became white and dazzling. Elijah and Moses, of all people, suddenly appeared, and talked with Him. A bright cloud overshadowed the disciples.

Peter was staggered, but enthusiast that he was – immediately suggested building three tabernacles on that holy place, one for Jesus, one for Moses, and one for Elijah. But God's 'tabernacling', God's dwelling with mankind, does not any longer depend upon building a shrine. It depends on the presence of Jesus, instead. And so, a cloud covered them, and a Voice spoke out of the cloud, saying that Jesus was His beloved Son, whom the disciple should 'hear'. God's dwelling with mankind depends upon our listening to Jesus.

Then, just as suddenly, it is all over. What did it mean? Why Moses and Elijah? Well, these two men represent the Law and the Prophets of the Old Covenant, or Old Testament. But now they are handing on the baton, if you like: for both the Law and the Prophets found their true and final fulfilment in Jesus, the Messiah.

Why on top of a mountain? In Exodus we read that Moses went up Mount Sinai to receive the sacred covenant from Yahweh in the form of the Ten Commandments. Now Jesus goes up and is told about the 'sealing' of the New Covenant, or New Testament of God with man, which will be accomplished by His coming death in Jerusalem.

That day made a lifelong impact on the disciples. Peter mentions it in his second letter, 2 Peter 1:16 - 19 - invariably the reading for this day.

The Eastern Churches have long held the Transfiguration as a feast as important as Christmas, Epiphany, Ascension and Pentecost. But it took a long time for the West to observe the Transfiguration. The feast starts appearing from the 11th and 12th centuries, and the Prayer Book included it among the calendar dates, but there was no liturgical provision for it until the 19th century.

Fairtrade Foundation calls for tea-drinkers to 'brew it fair'

Tea-drinkers in the UK are being asked to help change the "woefully inadequate" wages and working conditions of the estate workers on tea plantations around the world.

The Fairtrade Foundation's new 'Brew It Fair' campaign is based on the findings of a report which sets out just how many workers on tea plantations live in "chronic poverty".

Much of the world's tea is auctioned, which means that a few very large buyers end up able to dictate the prices of how much they will pay for it. This has a brutal impact on the workers: a recent survey of 260 teagrowers and pickers in Kenya found that only one in five earn enough to feed and support their families and then also send their children to school.

The report says: "As tea drinkers, we are now used to paying very little for, and putting little value on, our cup of tea." But for the growers and pickers of tea, the "high levels of unstable work, low incomes and wags, gender discrimination and unsafe working conditions" continue. Fairtrade calls on the UK Government to introduce a new law on human rights and environmental due diligence (HREDD). This should be "centred on the needs of farmers and workers, with a focus on supporting living incomes and living wages..."

The report also urges UK tea-drinkers to buy Fairtrade tea, highlighting the Co-op, Marks & Spencer, Sainsbury's, and Waitrose as key supporters. The UK accounts for 61 per cent of all the Fairtrade tea sold in the world







Mary Magdelene July 22nd

Six Marys are mentioned in the New Testament, including Mary Magdalene, who is remembered this month in the church's calendar (22nd July). What can we learn from Mary's story?

We don't have to be defined by our past:

When Jesus encountered Mary, He cast seven demons out of her (Luke 8:2). As a result, her life was transformed, and she became a follower of Jesus. Her life as a disciple was no longer defined by the person she had been before. Like Mary, we don't have to let our past without Christ dictate how we see ourselves today.

Make Jesus the centre of our world:

Along with some of the women who had been cured of evil spirits and diseases (Luke 8:1-3), Mary followed Jesus and His disciples and supported them in ministry. She was there at the cross (Matthew 27:55-56) and one of the first to the tomb on the Sunday (Matthew 28:1; Mark 16:1 and John 20:1-18). Like Mary, we are called to serve Jesus as dedicated disciples.

Jesus uses the weakest people for His purposes:

Mary is a great example of Paul's words: 'But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong.' (1 Corinthians 1:27). At a time when women were regarded as second-class citizens with no real autonomy, Jesus had a special compassion and care for women. Alongside Mary, the women's witness to the resurrection was taken seriously. We shouldn't be quick to dismiss the things that don't agree with our expectations, as Jesus doesn't always do what we expect! He delights in working out His plans through unlikely people and in surprising ways. He did this through Mary, and if we allow Him, He can do it through us!

The Nicene Creed Part 2 Who is Jesus?

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

This month we are looking at what the Nicene Creed affirms about the person of Jesus Christ.

'We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God': Jesus is presented as the unique Son of God. This reflects the big debate at the time, which was to counter the teachings of Arius, who taught that Jesus was the first and greatest of God's creatures, but not the same as God the Father.

Today we can be more concerned about Jesus' authority as a moral teacher, neglecting that Jesus the man is also truly God. 'We have seen His glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father' (John 1:14).

'eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father': These words affirm the divinity of Jesus. The phrase 'begotten not made' is crucial in understanding Jesus as the unique Son of the Father, who existed eternally of the same divine nature as the Father.

'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning' (John 1:1,2). It is a powerful reminder that our belief revolves around trusting a person, not simply in a set of beliefs and moral teaching.

'through Him all things were made': The Creed affirms that Jesus the Son cannot be made, because through Him all things were made and only God can create from nothing.

'Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made.' (John 1:3). This implies that our world was made good, with a purpose in which we can share.

Also, Jesus has the last word in promising to bring everything in heaven and on earth together at the end of time under His Lordship (Ephesians 1:10). This makes a real difference to how we see and treat God's Creation and those created in God's image.

In response to this, can we say that Jesus is Lord of every area of our life?

In the second of a series of articles, Kenneth Harrod, Head of Theology and Media at Release International, the voice of persecuted Christians, reminds us of the realities of persecution today.

The persecution of Christians takes many forms. It crops up in many places and is perpetrated by people of various religions—and no religion. Why?

The night before he was crucified Jesus answers that question. While teaching his disciples he says:

'If the world hates you, know that it has hated me before it hated you. If you were of the world, the world would love you as its own; but because you are not of the world, but I chose you out of the world, therefore the world hates you ... All these things they will do to you on account of my name, because they do not know him who sent me.' (John 15:18-19, 21; ESV)

What is Jesus saying? He is warning his disciples that, in the future, they may be hated by the world—because they are *his* followers; because they serve *him*; because they proclaim good news, which is about *him*.

In other words, the persecution of Christians—for being Christians—is really the persecution of Jesus. It is one way in which the world demonstrates its hatred of Christ and its rejection of the gospel. This in turn, says Jesus, evidence of not knowing the one true God.

The New Testament maintains this perspective throughout, and it is so important that we see this. The persecution of Christians—for being Christians—is not merely a human rights issue or even a religious freedom issue (important though we might consider it is to uphold both of those cherished principles). It is a gospel issue.

Understanding that will inevitably shape the way we, as Christians in the UK, will seek to respond to the persecution of Christians around the world. Release International is a UK-based ministry called to love and serve those who suffer persecution for Christ and the gospel. A biblical understanding of persecution undergirds all that this ministry does. That includes calling Christians here in the UK to express fellowship with those who suffer—prayerfully, pastorally and practically. August 15th – The Blessed Virgin Mary

The Church responds with a resounding 'Yes' to that question, as we celebrate the Blessed Virgin Mary on 15thAugust. (Usually her feast day is on the 16^{th.}) An ancient name for this day is the transition of Mary – her crossing over to eternal life – or the assumption of Mary. But her story begins in the Gospels, in Nazareth and Bethlehem.

At the Annunciation, Gabriel announces the good news to Mary. She becomes a mother and embarks on a journey that takes her to the temple in Jerusalem, a wedding feast at Cana, the Cross of Calvary, and the upper room of Pentecost. Through Christian history her story has spoken to people in every age and culture and land.

As we look at her life now, there are two qualities that stand out. The first is thanksgiving. Mary came from a people that realised the importance of thanking God, and her response to the good news is to raise her heart in the words of the Magnificat. 'My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord and my spirit exults in God my saviour.'

The second quality is trust. Rowan Williams has written that despite the years of controversy about the place of our Lady, we still need to hold out our hands to her for guidance and succour. "For at the very least she is the first person to put her trust in God who is shown in Jesus." Through all that happened to her – the amazing news of Gabriel, no room at the inn, the worry over wine at the wedding – Mary ponders and trusts. To the servants at Cana, she says, "Do whatever Jesus tells you. It will be all right. You will see."

Thanksgiving and trust: easy enough to see in our Lady, but perhaps more difficult to own for ourselves. Yet Mary assures us that with God all things are possible. Holding on to that faith, we can journey with her Son through life and death to eternal life.
